



INTRODUCTION

Quarter 4 Update: October 1 - December 31, 2022

The 2022 Local General Election took place on October 15, which resulted in a new Mayor and three new Councillors for North Cowichan. Voting took place on election day, at two advance voting days, and by mail (new this election). A total of 8,534 people cast ballots, which equates to 32.04% voter turnout.

The election also included an assent voting question on regional recreation, which passed, in part due to the efforts of North Cowichan. The referendum was the result of many years' work to align local government funding with the residency of recreation facility users. For North Cowichan, this means a \$0.71 million decrease in funding toward recreation facilities.

Though not outlined in this strategic plan report, new Council orientation was conducted over the second half of Q4. Introduction to municipal business plans, organization, and budgets, as well as training on legislative procedures, and board and committee

appointments (including Cowichan Valley Regional District, which now includes four appointees from North Cowichan), was carried out.

Planning for the 2022 General Local Election was well underway during Q3. The nomination period for candidates closed September 9, with three candidates running for Mayor and 15 for the Office of Councillor. New for this election was the option to vote by mail-in ballot. Information sessions were held for candidates, information postcards were delivered to every household in the municipality, and voters were able to share their excitement for civic duty with selfie frames.

Round two of public engagement for the Municipal Forest Reserve Review kicked off at the end of November with an in-person information session and the launch of a survey. This round aimed to learn the public's preferred forest management scenario from four prepared by the UBC Partnership Group. A discussion guide, supported with input from the engagement working group, was developed in order to assist the public to understand the impact, implications, and trade-offs of the very technical scenario options. Two virtual information sessions were held in early December, and a parallel representative phone survey was also conducted during this time. The online survey remained open until the end of January, with a 'what we heard' report coming to Council in Q1 of 2023.

The Biodiversity Protection Policy Project got underway with the launch of a public engagement mapping exercise.

Development of Rowing Canada Aviron's national training facility on Quamichan Lake saw its first National Rowing Championships in November. A new dock was installed ahead of the meet. accumulation near 60 centimetres. Beginning on Boxing Day, warming temperatures and heavy rain created flood conditions, in particular around the Chemainus River. The Regional Emergency Operations Centre was activated, and evacuation alerts issued for properties adjacent to the river. Operations and fire crews provided on-the-ground support for flooded roads and for evacuations. Communications support both the snow and flood events with ongoing public information and announcements.

The final quarter of the year is also an opportunity to reflect back on significant milestones in 2022. The Official Community Plan was adopted, capping two years of extensive public and stakeholder engagement. Adoption of this new plan is a catalyst for further policy updates, including the zoning bylaw, which will begin public engagement 2023.
