# INTRODUCTION

*Quarter 3 Update: July 1 - September 30, 2023*

North Cowichan continued its sesquicentennial celebrations with a partnership event at the Forest Discovery Centre in August. The 150-activation team also attended several community events and parades.

Rowing Canada Aviron hosted the second National Championships in late September, which saw athletes from across Canada come to Quamichan Lake to compete in the three-day event. The BC Bike Race also returned. The three-day bike race, which set up a temporary base in Crofton, saw more than 600 riders compete on challenging bike courses on Maple Mountain and Mount Tzouhalem.

Steps taken continued to improve the water quality in Quamichan Lake and environmental issues in Somenos Marsh. A successful cutting program to remove invasive Parrot's Feather wrapped up. Environment staff, the Chief Administrative Officer, and the Mayor met with the Minister of Environment to determine partnership and financial support opportunities for the mitigation and management of blue-green algae blooms in Quamichan Lake.

Changes to the Building Bylaw to reflect new Step Code requirements were introduced in September. The changes will integrate provincial requirements to lower emissions in new homes and buildings.

The Quw'utsun Nation Working Group met in August to continue dialogue around the Municipal Forest Reserve and other important matters in the community. The group is making plans to schedule a joint Quw'utsun government-to-government meeting later this fall.

Steps to improve financial operations were taken, including investment of funds in term and cashable GICs to earn interest at a higher rate. Increases to parks and recreation fees, as well as for development applications, came into effect.

The Cowichan Aquatic Centre received updates including new fitness equipment, acoustic paneling, and a sliding glass door. During the annual maintenance shutdown, the aquatic centre's sauna was renovated with new interior cedar paneling and improved temperature controls.

A new summer drop-in program welcomed 67 youth to the Crofton Community Centre during July and August. The Youth Outreach team provided a variety of games and activities for youth in the Crofton and Chemainus areas.

Several staff members were recognized for long service milestones at an appreciation lunch. The all-staff event was an opportunity to recognize staff who reached milestones during the pandemic, as well as in 2023.

A new municipal website is well underway, with a site map and template established, and content, page, and navigation optimization in progress. The new site is expected to launch in Q4 and will replace the current website that was launched in 2013.

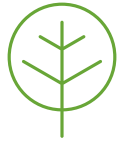
