INTRODUCTION

Quarter 4 Update: October 1 - December 31, 2023

Q4 marked the end of the first "back to normal" year at the Cowichan Aquatic Centre after several unusual years impacted by COVID-19. Admission numbers in Q4 increased by 10 per cent year over year and closed the year with 224,551 total visits. Overall, annual attendance in 2023 increased by 33 per cent over 2022 and surpassed 2019's pre-pandemic admissions by one per cent. Recreation program offerings also increased, and in Q4 99 swim lessons were offered with a plan to increase to 119 in Q1 and 179 by Q2 in 2024.

A comprehensive accessibility audit of 16 park sites took place to evaluate accessibility of these locations. The process provided staff with an overall assessment of each parks' access and ease of use, and to provide a better understanding of the fundamental features of the facilities within them as it relates to Canadian Standards Association (CSA) standards. Recommendations will be prioritized and addressed by staff starting in 2024.

In November, a second joint government-to-government meeting was held between Quw'utsun Nation and North

Cowichan Council. It was a positive and significant step toward continued collaborative work relating to the Municipal Forest Reserve and other issues of mutual interest.

The first-ever awards ceremony for the North Cowichan Fire Department took place in December. Firefighters from Crofton, Maple Bay, Chemainus, and South End halls were celebrated for their achievements.

After 10 years, it was time for a refresh of the northcowichan.ca website. A brand new user centric website was launched in December, which allows website visitors to better navigate to the information they need. The new site is also accessible, meeting the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2 international standard. Users with accessibility needs can access the website using their tools and settings. This includes things such as text alternatives for non-text content, captions, is fully functional from a keyboard, and presents content in predictable ways.

Jon Lefebure and David Haywood received North Cowichan's

Freedom of the Municipality honour, the highest symbol of respect and esteem from a local government to an individual. Both recipients previously served on North Cowichan council. Jon Lefebure served for 16 years, 13 of which as mayor (1999-2008; 2011-2018). David Haywood served as councillor from 2000 to 2011 and school board trustee from 1969 to 1978.

The 1959 Duncan All Stars baseball team, 1983 Cowichan Thunderettes basketball team, Ernie Mansueti, Helen Gosnell, and Jason Sandquist were inducted into the North Cowichan-Duncan Sports Wall of Fame in November. Over 200 guests attended an event to celebrate the inductees at the Cowichan Golf Club. Council approved \$246,750 in Grants-in-Aid to support community groups operating within the municipality. Council also approved 149 properties for Permissive Tax Exemptions in 2024 totaling \$627,000. This funding allows community organizations to better support and serve North Cowichan residents through their initiatives and programs.

2023 was a record year in building permit fees collected with a total of 245 building permit applications representing 229 new residential units for a total building permit revenue of \$2,187,264.

Council adopted new construction standards and the Building Bylaw was amended to help support North Cowichan's emission goals (to reduce emissions by 80 per cent by 2050). As of January 1, 2024, Emission Level 3 of the BC Zero Carbon Step Code must be met and on July 1, 2024, Emission Level 4 must be met. The Energy and Zero Carbon Step Code requirements impact primary space and water heating in new construction only and are based on performance. Secondary heating sources, as well as auxiliary appliances such as stoves and barbecues, are not affected by the changes. The Economic Development Committee made strides in developing a revised economic development action plan and launched a survey to local business and industry representatives and owners to gather feedback and input.

This represents a total increase of 33% over 2022 and surpasses pre-covid 2019 admissions by 1%. Recreation program offerings to the public increased and in Q4 99 swim lesson sets were offered, with 119 planned in 2024 Q1 and 179 by Q2. All swim lessons sold out during winter registration in December.

 The final 'what we heard' report for the Municipal Forest Reserve review was presented to Council. This report and presentation included Round 2 surveys, information sessions, and Connect page interaction details around public preferences for the draft forest management scenario options. The summary has been provided to the UBC Partnership Group, which will review and consider making changes to the four draft forest management scenario options. It is anticipated that the final forest management scenario options will be provided to Council in Q2.  Joint Request For Proposals for Waterworks supplies was issued by CVRD on behalf of CVRD, Ladysmith, Duncan and North Cowichan. Staff met with the CVRD and other local governments on the Cowichan Region Hazard, Risk and Vulnerability Analysis for workshop two of three.
