INTRODUCTION

Quarter 3 Update: July 1 - September 30, 2024

This past quarter included National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day on September 30. The day was recognized with an all-staff communication, which included information to enhance staff education related to reconciliation and participation in local events. Employees were encouraged to wear orange to work to show their support.

Mayor and Council approved a grant to M'akola Housing Society to assist with the events held in respect of the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, including the Every Child Matters March.

Since June, 335 homes have converted to electric heat pumps, which has resulted in an estimated 1,040 tonne reduction in GHG emissions annually.

After several years of planning and engagement, the Climate Change Risk Assessment and Adaptation Strategy was approved by Council on September 4. This completes one of Council's

Strategic Plan objectives and provides staff with a roadmap for implementation and direction to research and propose projects for implementation through the business planning process.

The Youth Recreation Services team operated daily drop-in programs throughout the summer at the Crofton Community Centre, which provided youth with a variety of activities and a safe place to hang out throughout the summer. A total of 455 drop-in visits occurred during this 8-week period.

Admission and membership numbers at the Cowichan Aquatic Centre this last quarter have increased compared to Q3 in 2023. Admissions have increased by 1% and membership sales have increased by 29%.

North Cowichan held its annual staff appreciation event on September 5, which included long service certificate presentations by Mayor Rob Douglas and CAO Ted Swabey.

Communications with the public are up 113% using the Instagram platform and 60.4% users are accessing the northcowichan.ca website using their mobile phones.

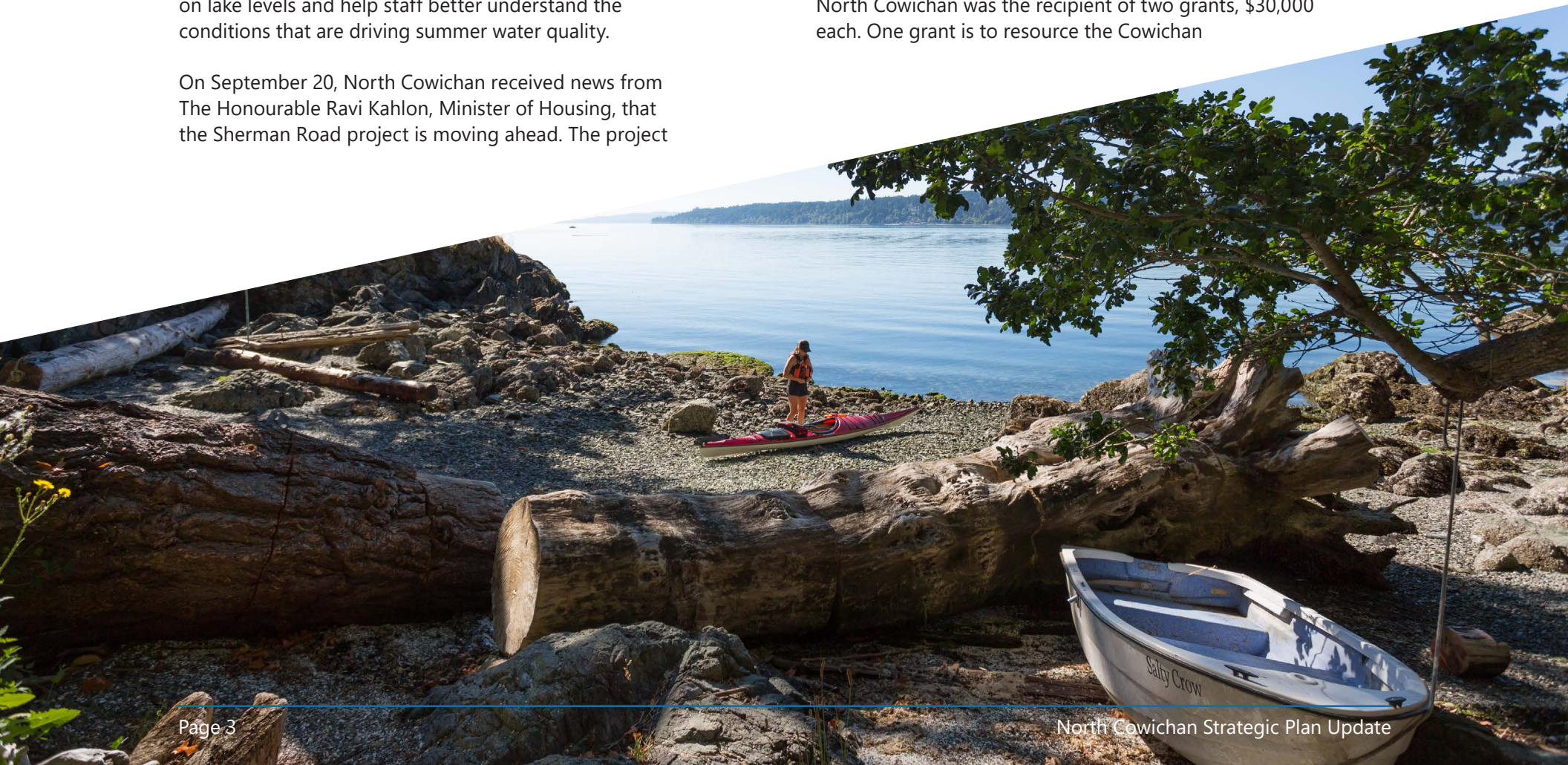
Environment staff installed a water level logger in Somenos Lake, which will provide continuous data on lake levels and help staff better understand the conditions that are driving summer water quality.

On September 20, North Cowichan received news from The Honourable Ravi Kahlon, Minister of Housing, that the Sherman Road project is moving ahead. The project

will provide 92 units of affordable co-op housing.

Staff are preparing a Rural Economic Diversification and Infrastructure Program application to support the design of a new reservoir to service the industrial properties off Highway 18.

North Cowichan was the recipient of two grants, \$30,000 each. One grant is to resource the Cowichan



Interagency Response Team, which will assist in addressing public disorder. The second grant is from Infrastructure and Communities Canada. This grant will support the 2024 Point in Time count of the homeless within the municipality and further assist our efforts for funding from the federal government.

Consultation is now complete for the Safer Community Plan, and a “What We Heard” summary will be shared this fall with councils, partners, stakeholders, and the public.

Senior staff have maintained an ongoing dialogue with the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions staff, ensuring continuous communication and collaboration. Mayor & Council and senior staff met with recovery service provider Together We Can in support of additional treatment services in the Cowichan Valley.

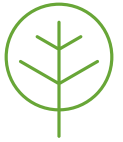
