# **QUARTER END REPORT**

Oct 2024 through Dec 2024 Open Report

## NCD RCMP Service to the community Oct – Dec 2024:

#### 1. Drug Seizure

On Oct 23, 2024 a traffic stop on Drinkwater Rd by one of your watch members led to a

significant drug seizure as a result of a stop for a motor vehicle infraction. During contact with the driver, the member noticed what appeared to be drugs and cash in plain view inside the vehicle. A drug investigation was immediately initiated and the driver was arrested. The investigation led to charges against a mid level drug trafficker from Victoria. Meth, fentanyl, cocaine, handgun and ammo were located in the vehicle. Charges have been laid with more coming pending drug testing.



#### 2. Community Safety Expo

On Oct 26<sup>th</sup>, your NCD RCMP detachment, in partnership with many emergency response organizations from the Cowichan Valley gathered at the new NCD RCMP detachment to host the Community Safety Expo. Despite the possibility of rain, the weather held off and it was actually sunny for much of the day. It was a great success and an



eye opening opportunity to see the extent to which the local community has invested in emergency management operations/equipment. The event was well attended. Your RCMP IPS unit barbequed hotdogs and hamburgers for attendees. Many local business owners donated many prizes for those community members attending. Country Grocers very generously donated much of the food for the event. The event was the culmination of many planning meetings and efforts of many people, however, the catalyst behind the initiative was your Plainclothes Commander, S/Sgt Deb Kelly. Plans in place to repeat next year as well.

# 3. Suspect arrested and charged in 2022 Duncan fatal stabbing

NCD RCMP and Vancouver Island Integrated Major Crime Unit:

The NCD RCMP and Vancouver Island Integrated Major Crime Unit (VIIMCU) arrested a suspect on Thursday, October 17, 2024 in a stabbing death of a 33-year-old man in

Duncan on July 16, 2022. The suspect, 53-year-old Todd White of Duncan was arrested by police without incident and has been charged with manslaughter.

# 4. Missing person located deceased

NCD RCMP located a missing person, deceased in the water offshore in Cowichan Bay. On October 23 NCD RCMP received a report of a missing 26-year-old man. The missing person was last seen on October 21, 2024. Your detachment launched a missing person's investigation, conducting numerous tasks in an effort to locate. On October 24, 2024, RCMP Police Dog Services and your members were deployed to search community locations and shorelines, while the RCMP West Coast Marine Unit was deployed to search waters in Cowichan Bay, with the assistance of the RCMP helicopter and Marine Search and Rescue. Those joints efforts led to the discovery of the missing person at around 12:30 pm that day.

## 5. Drug Investigation

Your GIS and SCU members executed a search warrant and seized cell phones and other electronic devices at a residence. During the search they located 1.5 kilos of coke, 1.0 kilo of fentanyl and 1.5 kilos of meth. The suspect is facing drug trafficking charges pending completion of drug testing.



#### 6. Sonic Boom

On Nov 1st your detachment received numerous reports of what sounded like a huge explosion south of town at 1:35am. The blast was too large and deep sounding to be fireworks from Halloween. Many people felt their homes and windows shake. Fire Dept members and RCMP deployed believing a building might have exploded. No damage was located nor further reports of a serious incident were received. Many theories have been provided including the detonation of dynamite, or, a boom from a super sonic aircraft. The RCMP Air 8 helicopter was dispatched and conducted aerial searches in and around North Cowichan Duncan but no evidence was observed that would explain the sound of the explosion.

# 7. RCMP investigating after residential fire turns fatal

Your detachment members were called to residential fire in North Cowichan that turned turned fatal. On October 28, 2024, at 9:30 a.m., NCD RCMP were called to the 1600 block of Maple Bay Rd to assist with a residential fire. The blaze was such that it necessitated the mobilization of firefighters from North Cowichan, Maple Bay, Crofton and Chemainus. Three people died in the blaze. Precise cause of the fire is unknown but the fire started in the basement in a part of the home that was sublet to other occupants. The RCMP worked with the Coroner to identify the bodies and complete NOKs.

## 8. Drug seizure from traffic stop

On Nov 4<sup>th</sup> one of your watch members conducted a traffic stop with a vehicle on TCH with two occupants (female and male). In the course of the road stop, the member noticed what appeared to be drugs in plain view. A CDSA (drugs) investigation was initiated and the investigator located 5 oz of meth, fentanyl, cocaine, oxy and Xanax. Also located was \$5000 in cash, scales,



trafficking paraphernalia...etc. Both occupants are known to your detachment for drug trafficking. Charges being laid pending drug testing confirmation.

## 9. Coffee With A Cop

Seven of your detachment members attend the Chamber of Commerce/Tourism Center in November to meet with the public for a Coffee With A Cop opportunity. The COC provided all the coffee, refreshments and juice and location to meet with community leaders and members to discuss issues of concern and find out how your



detachment is dealing with increasing calls for service and proactive policing efforts in the community. It was great opportunity have a dialogue about a number of topics including Restorative Justice, MHA calls for service, increasing call volumes, proactive time available for members to support the community...etc. Another CWAC is planned after February 2025. In early February we are planning our next community Town Hall to hear from the community about what they would like to see their detachment members working on in the new year.

## 10. Cowichan Capitals vs. Port Alberni Bulldogs.

In November your detachment members celebrated the First Responder night at the local hockey game. Lots of people were in attendance. A pre-Remembrance Day celebration was organized with the Royal Canadian Legion and the Cowichan Pipes and Drums Band. George Brewster recited in Flanders Fields (he was a WWII Spitfire pilot\_101 years old). He did a great job with his booming voice. The Capitals and RCMP mascots did a puck drop for the players. RCMP Recruiting was there with recruiting information. The event was organized by S/Sgt Deb Kelly and the Capitals Hockey Club Manager.



11. Your Indigenous Policing Service members coordinated a "Name the Canoe" contest in November. Submissions were received from community members, with the name chosen for the 29' ceremonial canoe being conducted by Cowichan Tribes Elders. The winner of the event was Claudia Sylvester with the name being "S-hwulmuhw'a'lh Qiq'uq'uls". The name was added to the canoe as a



decal and means "many different police officers" and celebrates the cross section of members in the Valley here to serve and protect community members. The canoe was purchased last year by the IPS Unit to participate in cultural and youth events where paddling trips are planned. It has also been used to gather grocery donations for the Basket Society to help feed the unhoused in the Valley. Congratulations to Claudia as the winner of the event. She won a beautifully carved and painted paddle for her creativity.

**12.** In December your Community Safety Unit members coordinated the annual "Cram the Cruiser" event using the detachment van. Members remained outside of the Canadian Tire Store and collected donated gifts for the Basket Society. The police van was almost completely crammed full, along with raising \$1400 in cash donations. The gifts were

presented to less fortunate families at the Basket Society's Christmas dinner. The detachment was very thankful to all community members for their generosity.



**13.** On December 19<sup>th</sup>, 11 RCMP staff members (including our new District Officer, S/Supt Bruce Singer) volunteered their time to assist with the Christmas Dinner Service for the Elders at Cowichan Tribes. It was a great event with lots of smiles shared.
