#### RE: Request for extension to project timelines to fully utilize awarded grant

Dear Mayor and Council,

I'm contacting you today on behalf of the Village project currently located at 610 Trunk Road in Duncan. As you are aware, the Village project provides 34 sleeping cabins with wraparound support to unsheltered adults in our region, many of whom also experience complex support requirements. The project is provided in partnership between Cowichan Housing Association, Lookout Housing and Health Society, City of Duncan, and BC Housing, with operational funding provided through UBCM Strengthening Communities' Services grant submitted on behalf of the region by Municipality of North Cowichan. As evidence of the positive impact of the project, included with this letter is a document that summarizes some of the statistics we've tracked related to the project, as well as a description of other project successes achieved to-date.

The project funding is for one year, but due to supply chain challenges and delays in the transportation of the cabins, the <u>full</u> start-up of the project was delayed. In addition, we've been able to keep operational costs lower than initially anticipated. As a result, we have unspent funds remaining that we want to use to continue the operation of the site.

It is our intent to operate the Village at the existing site for an additional 8 months (consistent with the TUP extension request to the City of Duncan), which will allow time for us to find a more permanent site for the project, and if not possible, transition the residents to alternative housing. To operate the site over this 8-month period, our plan is to use the unexpended UBCM funds supplemented by funding from BC Housing. Not asking BC Housing to cover the full 8 months of the project extension, makes it more likely for them to support the request. We are providing BC Housing with a financial request in support of this project in early September 2022.

We are optimistic for many reasons that the extension will provide us with the opportunity to continue the project and it's demonstrated successes at another location. However, our ability to do so rests upon having an extension of the UBCM funding. For this reason, we respectfully request that you ask UBCM for an 8-month extension to the project.

# The Village: Summary of Success

## **Project Overview**

The project provides temporary housing in the form of 34 sleeping units (cabins) with individualized support services for unsheltered people in the Cowichan Valley through which their underlying health and social needs can be addressed. Project activities are part of a comprehensive, multi-faceted, and holistic response to homelessness and related issues across the region. In this way, the project is an essential part of the continuum of services for unsheltered people in the Cowichan Valley and represents an important first step in helping those who are street intrenched.

People supported through the project have continued access to multiple on-site services including but not limited to food security programs, case planning, health and safety programming, and community referrals. Site amenities will include c-can washrooms/shower units, an outdoor eating area in each pod, and a secure area for the distribution of medication and for people to meet with outside support services.






Operations at the Village site include provision of emergency shelter for 34 residents, including 2 meals per day and access to 2 Shelter Resource Workers 16 hours per day, 7 days a week. Lookout Peer Workers are scheduled 4 hours per day, 7 days a week who assist in daily duties on-site, interacting with peers in the community, and fellow residents on-site. This staffing model and site layout enables community service provider's meeting with residents on a consistent, daily basis. Blackbird Security provides overnight security from 12 midnight to 8 am daily.

## **Project Successes**



The site averages 24 health and wellness visits each day from external community service providers/partners, enabling wrap-around services for residents who experience great difficulty in accessing essential services in the community. This has proven to be one of the most valuable services provided to the site, demonstrating how the site assists in the continuum of care for the site residents.





Daily health and wellness services at the site include visits from:


- Island Health's Public Health Outreach team, Substance Use Integrated Team, Assertive Community Treatment team;

- Nurse Practitioners/Healthcare Professionals;
- House of Friendship representatives.

Research demonstrates that people who are homeless have high rates of emergency health care utilization (i.e., emergency rooms, ambulance services), and are 5 times more likely to be hospitalized than the general public, often for a much longer time. Homeless people experience a higher rate of a broad range of physical and mental health issues, they routinely have difficultly in accessing healthcare, which increases their reliance on emergency services.

Prior to being supported at the Village, 15% of the residents indicated they regularly accessed healthcare. However, after becoming sheltered at the Village, 68% of the residents noted they were regularly accessing healthcare.

#### Programs at the Village

The Village hosts a variety of social and recreational programs that focus on healing, trauma and harm reduction, cultural connections, work experience, and building life skills and practices. These programs include education, arts and crafts (such as therapeutic rock painting, carving, writing in traditional languages, drawing), gardening, carpentry, and site beautification.






The Village employs peer workers who are residents at the site. They provide an extensive array of work experience, responsibilities, and opportunities to give back to the community, which assists in building self-esteem and worth. The peer workers also assist Lookout staff with daily tasks, including harm reduction distribution and education, site cleanup (internal & external), as well as perimeter walks/community engagement. As well as in addition to providing valuable assistance to their peers in a way that trained staff cannot replicate. Lookout partners with the Cowichan Community Action Team (CAT) as well, offering the opportunity for residents to participate in Outreach work, provide harm reduction (HR) supplies, and educate people in the use of HR supplies (including naloxone administration training/Overdose response). The CAT Streetsmart Outreach Team also helps cleaning up garbage in the broader community of Duncan. Of all Village residents, 67% are actively involved in peer work programs.

"Since moving into the site I've managed to maintain full time employment, I've put on weight, I've come a long ways. My family looks at me in a completely different light now."















#### **Site and Community Security**

Staff on site have been actively monitoring the 150-meter radius of the site since opening, engaging with individuals who may be trespassing, loitering, littering, or openly using substances in the area. In response to feedback and requests from local residents and businesses, we have since increased the number and focus of our walks to include intensive garbage collection. This increase has helped to improve our relationships with community members with increasingly positive support from the neighbouring community.


Blackbird Security and Duncan Bylaw Statistics reflect the combined efforts of the security team responding to community needs and feedback in the residential and business vicinity of the Village site.

Since increased monitoring was put in place through the Village, the number of people encountered in the area has reduced significantly. The number of incidents follow this trend, displaying the effectiveness of the site security team's efforts in the community.
